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## **Women and Freemasonry**

Many Freemasons are blissfully unaware that such a thing as feminine Freemasonry exists. Others would just prefer to do the ostrich thing and pretend it isn't there. Reported statistics indicate that worldwide, feminine Freemasonry is gaining initiates in multiples of the malecraft Freemason initiates.



Freemasonry for women has existed from at least the early 1900s and possibly earlier. I'm not referring to Eastern Star or any of the other feminine organisations considered part of the 'Family of Freemasonry.' Nor am I referring to those women who were initiated solely as a result of them surreptitiously learning the secrets of the degrees by stealth and eavesdropping. I'm talking about full blown, initiatic Masonry. After all, if

we in malecraft Masonry can strive to improve ourselves through Freemasonry, why should women not follow the same or similar path?

I'm not advocating women in our lodges. Femalecraft Masonry also has no desire to have men in their lodges. There however exist obediences commonly referred to as Co-Masonry that has both men and women. What is discussed here is Female Freemasonry.

The Order of Women Freemasons is a fraternal organisation based in the United Kingdom and is the larger of the two Masonic bodies for women only.

The Order was founded in 1908 as the Honourable Fraternity of Antient Masonry, and formed by a small group of men and women who seceded from the Co-Masonic movement. They disagreed with the theosophical precepts and the governance of the Co-Masonic organisation and wanted to return to the



traditional workings of English Masonry. The leader and first Grand Master was W. F. Cobb. By the time the first and male Grand Master resigned from the Order in 1912, six Lodges had been consecrated. The second and all subsequent Grand Masters have been women.

The sanctions of United Grand Lodge of England against any of their members who associated with 'irregular bodies' of Freemasons, including those admitting women, meant that there were few male candidates after 1910. In 1920 a petition was sent from the Order to UGLE for recognition as a bona fide Masonic body but this was refused. After that men were no longer accepted as candidates into the Order although there were still a few who, distancing themselves from their own Obedience, chose to remain in high office. In 1935, the male Grand Secretary died and the remaining male Grand Lodge officer, the Deputy Grand Master, was asked to resign. From this date the Order has been exclusively female. Relations with UGLE are now cordial.

The degree of the Holy Royal Arch was introduced in 1929 and the Mark Degree in 1946. Other Degrees including the Chivalric Degrees were introduced in the late 1940s and the 1950s. All these are administered by the same Grand Lodge as the Craft Degrees.

The Honourable Fraternity of Antient Masonry took as its subtitle in 1958 'The Order of Women Freemasons', to make its single-sex nature more obvious and it is by this name that it is known today.

The Order currently comprises 358 working Craft Lodges, based in the British Isles, Australia, Canada, South Africa, Spain and Zimbabwe. There are over 10,000 members, at last count. The workings and Constitution of the Order parallel those of the United Grand Lodge of England.

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The Order of Women Freemasons opened its first Lodge in Ontario in 1954. In 2011 there are three Craft Lodges operating in the Greater Toronto Area.

Lodge Keele Gate #172 meets in Mississauga. Lodge Pioneer Hope/Trillium of York #72 and #79 meets in Scarborough. Lodge Heritage #84 meets in Whitby. There are approximately 100 active members living as far away as Peterborough, Niagara Falls and Kansas. Lodge St. Lawrence #206, a Lodge of Installed Masters meets three times a year in Scarborough.

We are not a benevolent society but believe in upholding the cause of charity. Since 2007 over \$30,000 has been donated to local charities by Canadian Lodges. Our Grand Lodge Headquarters are in London, England.

In June of 2008 a large contingent of Women Freemasons from all three Lodges travelled to London to celebrate the Order's 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary. The Centenary Celebration took place in the Royal Albert Hall in London which was filled to capacity by Women Freemasons from all over the world. The Canadian contingent received their Mark Degree at our headquarters in London in the week following the Centenary.

From that beginning in June 2008, we studied diligently, sent others over to receive their Mark Degree and were thrilled to have Archstone Mark Lodge #6 reinstated on April 9, 2011.

The women involved come from all walks of life. We enjoy the fellowship of good friends, the opportunity of self-expression by participation in the beautiful ceremonies and ritual and the sanctuary and peace within the Lodge from the rush and turmoil of the present world. We welcome inquiries from



any women of 21 years and over who are interested in developing their character and bringing fullness and meaning to their lives.

- Believe it in your **mind**

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### **Toronto East Masonic Centre (T.E.M.C.)**

Across our grand jurisdiction there are several examples of temples recently erected that are several floors in height and self-sufficient. In a typical three-storey scenario, one floor is reserved for Freemasonry, while two are leased to tenants.



In Toronto, due to specific living space demand, we are considering the development of a taller building, to possibly provide condominium units or retirement villas that we anticipate would be sold in advance and prior to completing construction. We are currently looking at securing property in the Birchmount-Warden corridor.

Whether we can actually afford (the monthly interest payments) to build such an edifice is another question altogether. Nonetheless, we are trying to resolve all the issues in an expeditious manner.

On behalf of our brethren, past, present and future, the board is considering not only the viability of its investment ultimately, but also the “look and feel” of our new temple. Over the summer months (online, on the phone and in-person), the TEMC board has primarily debated whether the projected feasibility of large-scale development is worth the risk.

In the future, whether our temple is viewed as bleak and ominous, or bright and welcoming is a per-square-foot cost equation, frankly. The marketing and positioning of Freemasonry, and thus the successful distribution of units to 3<sup>rd</sup> party partners in the Scarborough community, whether purchasers or renters, is another related issue being discussed as well.

The board members each agree our new temple will consist minimally 20,000 square feet for our unique Masonic purposes. We also agree that financing our deal to not only purchase land but to develop atop that land is critical. Therefore, members were recently asked to offer an opinion with respect to their appetite for risk.

In order to continue moving forward, notwithstanding our anticipated fundraising efforts, which needs to be wound up, the affairs of SMTC need to be wound down and its assets transferred to the new board upon the conclusion of its 2010 audit, as do those of East Toronto eventually.

Due to the complicating matter of the outstanding SMTC debenture holders, this particular activity requires the advice of both legal and accounting experts.

I look forward to the decisions of all the respective boards, and expect serious decisions to be made shortly, enabling us to secure land and begin the process to properly develop our new temple.

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### **The Grand Master's Project**

The Grand Master's Charitable Project for 2011-2013 will be Camp Trillium, the Childhood Cancer Support Center. Masonic Foundation of Ontario Project Number: 2847. The facts below will acquaint you with Camp Trillium.

#### **Vision:**

Camp Trillium's vision is to reach children with cancer by providing them and their families with fun and enriching recreational opportunities. We achieve this vision by providing outstanding year-round camp and recreational experiences to promote the healing process in a safe family-inclusive environment.





The Camp Trillium Spirit is captured in its Core Values:

- **Fun:** Is what Camp Trillium does and how we do it – creating memories which last a lifetime through laughter and friendship
- **People:** Our enthusiastic campers, dedicated staff and committed volunteers and generous supporters are the Camp Trillium Family
- **Care:** Camp Trillium embraces campers and their families with care in a safe and healing environment
- **Innovation:** Through innovative approaches, Camp Trillium provides a camping opportunity that encourages inclusiveness, creativity, personal growth and achievement
- **Integrity:** Integrity is at the forefront of what Camp Trillium does, from the stewardship of resources and assets, to the development and delivery of programs

Camp Trillium is a leader in oncology camping programs. Year round in the province of Ontario 56 programs are provided for children living with cancer and their families and in 2010, over 3,100 campers participated in residential and family camps as well as 8 week Day Camps held across the province.

Camp Trillium is the largest provider of recreational programs for children living with cancer in North America. And is the lead association in the development of oncology camping policy and procedures templates in use in most camps in Canada.

Camp Trillium is a place where children afflicted with cancer can enjoy what many take for granted... fun, friendships, and a respite from hospitals and treatment, but most importantly the chance to be normal. The chance to be recognized for skills in sailing, canoeing, swimming, arts and crafts, skating, cross-country skiing, drama, rather than the disease that inhabits their body.

Camp Trillium is unfortunately no longer funded by the Canadian Cancer Society, Ontario Division because it no longer falls into their mandate to focus on Cancer research. Camp Trillium's focus is making sure that children living through cancer and their families have a special place to develop friendships, strengthen family bonds, have fun and challenge themselves to learn new skills. Thus, Camp Trillium receives no government funding and the bulk of the monies come through private donations from service clubs, special events and generous individuals.

Camp Trillium has benefitted in the past from many hours of volunteer Masonic labour at its Rainbow Lake site. They have been thrilled with this past support from the local Masons and are delighted with the commitment to continue to support Camp Trillium through this project.

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## **What's That All About?**

### **Who discovered, designed or invented Masonry?**

No one man, any more than any one man discovered, designed or invented democracy, or philosophy, or science, or any one government. Freemasonry is the result of growth. Many Masons had a part in it; it has taken to itself teachings from many religions, philosophies, systems of knowledge, symbols.

The most generally accepted orthodox belief as to those who “began” Freemasonry is that the Craft is a descendant of Operative Masons. These Operatives inherited from unknown beginnings, of which there may have been several and were probably many, practices and some form of ritual. Speculative Masonry, reaching back through Operative Masonry, touches hands with those who followed unknown religions in which, however, many of the Speculative principles must have been taught by the use of symbols as old as mankind and therefore universal, and not the product of anyone people or time.

### **Why are candidates hoodwinked?**

Blindfolding a candidate is symbolical of that state in which he has “long been in darkness and now prays for light.”

It is not to keep him from seeing the lodge room, or the officers, or the brethren, but to make a deep and lasting impression on his mind, that Masonically, he has no, or but partial, light, and that only by the consummation of the ceremonies for which he has asked and which the lodge has granted, may he receive that Masonic light which will enable him to “travel in foreign countries and receive Master’s wages.”


That the conclusion of parts of Masonic degrees be accompanied by unexpected sight and sound is a very old and very effective way of making an event memorable.

### **What is a “recognized Grand Lodge”?**

Each Grand Lodge has different conceptions of “regularity.” Thus the Grand Lodge in Country A will ‘recognize’ - that is, accept as equal, regular, legitimate Freemasonry - the Grand Lodge of Foreign Country X, while the Grand Lodge of Country B is not satisfied that the Grand Lodge of Foreign Country X conforms to all the requirements of the Grand Lodge of Country B. Thus a Grand Lodge of a foreign country may be legitimate Masonry to the Grand Lodge of one Country, and ‘clandestine’ or ‘irregular’ or ‘unrecognized’ by another Country. \*\*\*\*\*The Masonic Service Association publishes every July a chart showing what Grand Lodges outside the United States are “recognized” by each of the forty-nine Grand Lodges of the nation.



### Why do brethren entering and leaving a lodge salute the Master?



Masons entering or leaving a lodge salute the Master at the Altar if the lodge is at labour. This practice assures the Master that the brother knows on what degree the lodge is open. A brother making a wrong sign can be instructed immediately. It informs the Master that the brother is a Mason of the degree on which the lodge is open; if he makes an inferior sign, and cannot, on request, give the right one, the Master can then use other means to ascertain that no Entered Apprentice or Fellowcraft is present in a Master Mason lodge.

The salute is also a silent assurance to the Master and through him to the brethren: "I remember my obligations."

Brethren salute on retiring to get permission to leave. No one can enter or leave a lodge room while a lodge is at labour without permission. If the Master does not wish the brother who salutes to retire he tells him so, instead of responding to the salute.

### Define Hail; Hale; Hele; Heal.

The first two words are pronounced alike, but with different meanings. Hail is to greet. Hale means hearty, well. The next two words are also pronounced alike, but with different meanings. Hele (Anglo-Saxon) is an old word meaning to cover, conceal. Heal means to make well. "Hele and conceal" is one of the many word pairs in the ritual that go back to the growth of the English language, when two words were often used to insure that the hearer understood the meaning of at least one.

### Why do the stairs in the Second Degree wind?

In I Kings VI:8 appears "The door for the middle chamber was in the right side of the house: and they went up with winding stairs into the middle chamber, and out of the middle into the third." The Fellowcraft climbs the winding stairs to reach the middle chamber where are paid the wages he has earned, in corn, wine and oil. Symbolists find an especial significance in the "winding" of the stairs, denoting the necessity for a courageous ascent. Stairs that wind do not disclose what is ahead as does a straight stair. He who climbs a winding stair in confidence does so because he is a man grown, no weakling, but one able to face even an unknown future with courage.

The Fellowcraft degree as a whole is a symbol of manhood, so it is appropriate to its teachings that winding stairs denote courage. The Entered Apprentice degree as a whole is a symbol of youth and the Master Mason degree as a whole a symbol of age.

*The Freemason At Work* is frequently quoted as the authority on why we do certain things and why we say certain things. To quote the Forward of the book –

The queries Bro. Carr was asked to deal with vary greatly in complexity as well as in subject-matter. Where a pure issue of fact is concerned the answer may be accepted as authoritative. Where someone has put the insoluble question, why a particular expression is used in the ceremonies, Bro. Carr's historical exposition provides as satisfactory an answer as the case admits; he might have cited what Justice Holmes said in an analogous case - 'The life of the law has not been logic; it has been experience.' Where the question involves expressing a preference between two or more possible solutions, Bro. Carr has not been afraid to follow a statement of the relevant facts with an expression of his own opinion, but he has not done so dogmatically, or claimed to have said the last word. Bro. Carr's opinion on any Masonic question must carry weight, but he would certainly not wish anyone to adopt it merely on the authority of his name, and the most important thing is that he provides material for informed discussion.

If you can find the book and buy it, do so. You will not be sorry. However if that is not an option, then you can find the complete book at –

**First Day of Fall**

If we lived between the two tropics, Cancer and Capricorn, there would be no discernable seasons. It is warm all the time. And we live here – Why?

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**Admonition**  
**To the Brethren in open Lodge convened**  
**For the Election of the Master**

“From time immemorial it has been an established customs among Free and Accepted Masons, for each lodge, once in every year, at a stated period, to select from among those brethren who have served the office of Warden, an expert Craftsman to preside over them in the capacity of Master.” From this we deduce that the task of the Worshipful Master is that of President.

In another portion of our rituals he is tasked “to instruct and employ the brethren in Masonry,” thus making him an Instructor or Teacher, and an Employer.

Yet in another portion of our rituals the Master is called “a Ruler in the Craft,” that is: a person who rules or commands. Some have even suggested that the gavel gives him the powers of a Despot, though in another place he is obliged “to submit to the awards and resolutions of his brethren in general lodge convened . . .” reducing his exalted status to that of a Servant - and not just a “run-of-the-mill servant, but one has promised at his installation: “not to be insensible to his duties, nor to his responsibilities for the faithful discharge of the same.”

In another place he is prompted to administer the duties of that high office to the best of his skill and ability and, in another is obliged not to permit or suffer any deviations from the established usages, customs and landmarks. That makes him an Administrator and a Policeman as well. That is a rare breed of a servant. And I could say more but . . .

I am giving you this perspective on the role of the Master you are now about to elect for the ensuing 12 months (or until a new master is elected and installed in his stead) in order for you to reflect and be cautious on your choice of the Master - and to remind you that at installation you will be required to promise him Obedience, in addition to your obligation to “answer and obey all lawful signs and summonses” you receive from him or your lodge, and the regular attendance you have agreed to observe.

I had in the past the opportunity to remind you that a Lodge is not someone else's enterprise or recreational facility, accessible with a membership card whenever one feels like it. It is not. The lodge is a living organism, a family of brothers, where every member participates and pulls his weight, to the extent of the length of his cable tow, and according to his skills and abilities.



You now know with clarity what you are entitled to expect from the Master you are about to elect - and what that Master is entitled to expect from you.

You will now attend at the Altar and cast your ballot for the election of the Master.

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### **Wednesday September 28 2011**

#### **Rosh Hashana**

Rosh Hashanah, literally “head of the year,” is a Jewish holiday commonly referred to as the “Jewish New Year.” It is observed on the first day of Tishrei, the seventh month of the Hebrew calendar, starting at dusk as ordained in the Torah, in Leviticus 23:24.



Rosh Hashanah is the first of the High Holidays or Ten Days of Repentance which are days specifically set aside to focus on repentance that conclude with the holiday of Yom Kippur.

Jews believe Rosh Hashanah represents either analogically or literally the creation of the World, or Universe. However, according to one view in the Talmud, that of R. Eleazar, Rosh Hashanah commemorates the creation of man, which entails that five days earlier, the 25 of Elul, was the first day of creation of the Universe.

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### North American Membership Numbers

The Masonic Service Association of North America (MSANA) has released the list of U.S. and Canadian Masonic membership statistics for 2010. - <http://www.msana.com/msastats.asp>

The total Masonic membership of North American continues to decline although the annual rate of decline is slowing down.

The numbers for 2010 were 1,373,453 (lowest since the MSA began compiling stats in 1924). For Canada - 86,210, a decline of 2,489 from 2009.



In the U.S. only the Grand Lodges of Alabama, DC, Hawaii, New Mexico, Utah and in Canada the Grand Lodges of Newfoundland/Labrador show gains for 2010.

In Ontario, the drop was 972, from 49,595 in 2009 to 48,623 in 2010.



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## ... by the Lighthouse Beam

### Masonic Funeral Service

There are few occasions when Freemasons may perform their public ceremonies, e.g., cornerstone laying, open installation of officers, the periodic public educational program, and so on. By far, the most common is our Masonic Funeral/Memorial Service. It is at this time that most non-Masons are introduced to Freemasonry - perhaps, for the very first time. It is at and during that sombre service that most people present will form their opinion and perception of our Fraternity. Not being members of our Ancient Craft, and generally knowing very little about Freemasonry, they are often very curious as to who we are, what we stand for, and what is it that we believe in as an organization.



Conducting Masonic Funeral Services is as old as the Fraternity itself. In the days of Operative Masonry, stonemasons buried their own with great solemnity and reverence. The deceased Brother was a man they had worked with side-by-side for years - perhaps, even their entire lives. They extolled his virtues and the contributions he had made to the Craft's work. They spoke of the Eternal Life after death, and the need to perform "good work" toward all humanity throughout the course of a man's life. The entire guild and all of their families turned out in force to mourn their Brother's passing, and to express their sympathies to the Brother's family. This tradition has been carried forward for centuries to our present day Speculative Masonry.

The first thing any non-Mason will observe is the size of the turnout. If it is small, they may conclude that his Lodge did not hold the deceased Brother in very high esteem. Or, even worse, that Freemasons are much too busy with their own private lives and interests to practice the tenets of Charity and Brotherly Love of which we so loudly boast. In other words, they may conclude that we do not practice what we preach. If the turnout is large, the non-Mason is likely to come away with a very different impression of both the Fraternity and the deceased Brother.

Always remember that a Masonic Funeral Service is the final tribute we can pay to our fallen Brother. That is the appropriate time to thank the Brother's family for allowing him to share his time on Earth with our Fraternity. No, you may not have known the Brother personally, but if he was a member of your Lodge, he certainly deserves your presence at his funeral service. If he was a Brother, then he is entitled to all of the "lights, rights and benefits" of being a Freemason - and that certainly includes a well-attended Masonic Funeral Service. Attending these services are, in many ways, just as important as attending Lodge meetings - perhaps, even more so, because, as we can do nothing more for our Brother, the Funeral Service is really for the benefit of the deceased Brother's family and friends, and it exhibits our genuine care and concern for one of our own.

For those that may have forgotten, the Masonic Funeral Service is one of the most beautiful pieces of literature ever written. Simple, honest, and straight-forward, it offers each of us an opportunity to reflect upon our own mortality, and to reaffirm our individual faith in the Supreme Grand Master of Heaven and Earth. It draws forth its inspiration and words of comfort not only from our Volume of Sacred Law, but



also from many of the world's greatest literary geniuses. No one can listen to our service and not be impacted by the gentle, yet powerful, words that touch the heart of every person present - both Mason and non-Mason alike.

Consider the sobering passage from our Masonic Funeral Service: "One by one they pass away, the Brothers of our adoption, the Companions of our choice. A Brother whose hand we have clasped in the bonds of Fraternal Fellowship is now passing from our sight, and we know that we shall meet him on Earth no more."

One day, and we know not when, each one of us will be that Brother who has passed from sight. One day, each one of us will have ended our journey in this life. As your then cold and lifeless body is commended to the grave eternal, will you want your Masonic Brethren to be present and among those that mourn you, and to offer comfort and consolation to your loved ones?

As stated in our funeral service, you can do nothing more of a material nature for the departed Brother. Nevertheless, you can cherish his memory, and offer the tribute of respect and love to the late Brother's memory. Of even greater importance, you can be there to extend our fraternal sympathy to our Brother's deeply afflicted and sorrowing family in their bereavement. We must tell his loved ones, and demonstrate it by our physical presence, that our promises to be true to them are not hollow or empty words. We owe our Brother something, and this may be the very last opportunity we will ever have to repay that debt.

Brethren, if you receive a call from your Lodge or see a Masonic Funeral Notice in your local newspaper, take the 20 or 30 minutes out of your busy lives to make this final act of respect and tribute. No, you may not have personally known the Brother, but he was your Brother and that alone is enough to justify making the effort to attend and to demonstrate to the world that we Freemasons do, in fact, sincerely care about each other - both in life and in death.

Each of us will one day cross death's threshold. After spending years in the Masonic Fraternity, how would you feel if most of your Lodge Brothers were too occupied with their own self-interests to attend your Masonic Funeral Service? How will your loved ones feel about the organization you belonged to for so many years cannot even muster more than a small handful of members to stand around your casket?

This is one obligation and commitment that each of us should earnestly strive to fulfill even if we cannot always attend Lodge meetings. Let us demonstrate before the world that we are men who practice Brotherly Love - all the way to the grave's edge.
